
Dear Everybody,

We are so pleased to tell you that our new book, <u>Secrets of the Savanna</u>, will soon be on the bookshelves. The official publication date is May 24, 2006, but you may be able to get it sooner.



When we began writing this book, it was the story of how we ventured into the remote North Luangwa, fording wild rivers and bush bashing across uncharted, ravine-torn terrain to continue our lion study. We had to forgo the lion research when we found that commercial poachers were shooting 1,000 elephants each year, and virtually enslaving many villagers as shooters and porters. We set up a program to assist these desperate people so they would not have to shoot elephants to survive. After ten years, the villagers had sustainable jobs, education and health care and no elephants were being shot. Tourism was developing and the elephants were recovering. It is a happy success story.

But as we continued writing Secrets of the Savanna it became much more to us. Unexpectedly, the venture turned into a journey of self-discovery. Head-on we bumped into insights as to why men and women of our own species behave so differently. As we watched the elephants putting their societies back together, we explored the genetic basis for girl friends and the enhanced competition among males in both elephants and man. Since most of the adult elephants had been shot, the 'teenagers' who remained, led us to fascinating new discoveries of how a species under stress behaves. There were gangs of young aggressive males, 'single moms,' and 'teenage' mothers. As the story of the elephants untangled we learned more and more about ourselves, how similar we are to other creatures, and where our species may or may not be going.



The endearing female orphan *Gift*, who wandered into our camp at the young age of five, taught us more about elephant resiliency than any other. She spent years all alone watching small elephant families from a distance. But she, like the other orphans, had an ace up her trunk, and revealed some of the secrets of their survival to us. In the end, she was a young matriarch herself with a family of five - giving us all hope.

As we shut down the ivory trade, the commercial poachers shifted their sights from the elephants to us. To deal with this last dose of danger, we took a lesson that we learned from the elephants, and applied one of the secrets of the savanna. But wait, we shouldn't tell you too much!

You have been with us through the triumphs and disappointments. We sincerely hope that you enjoy Secrets of the Savanna.

DONATIONS FOR NORTH LUANGWA: Thanks to all who have shipped school & medical supplies to North Luangwa. They are GREATLY needed and appreciated. Still needed are: **School Supplies:** Crayons, pens, pencils, erasers, chalk, wildlife books & magazines (used are fine). Paper is too heavy to ship. **Medical Supplies:** Dial or other antibiotic soap, sterile latex gloves, Betadyne, antibiotic ointment/cream, gauze pads & rolls, first aid tape, Band-Aids, Ziploc bags. **Sewing Supplies:** Women's groups can use any fabric, thread or sewing notions. **Shipping:** Label medical as *Hygiene Supplies*, school and craft donations as *Education Supplies*. List on the USPS Customs Form as a *Gift* with a low value. Ship USPO surface/no insurance. **IMPORTANT:** Use sturdy boxes, w/2 strips of duct tape in each direction and overlay edges w/2-inch plastic tape. Use USPO "M BAG" for books at \$1 per pound, 11 lbs minimum and 66 lbs max per box. Use USPS Internet site: http://ircalc.usps.gov/ to calculate postage by weight. **SHIP TO: NLWCCDP, P.O.
